

WOLFRUN ACCESS REPAIRS

Blame it on the beavers. For the past several years they have been active in Moose Pond. Beavers, by nature, are never content with things as they are. We have seen the water level of the pond rise incrementally each of the last three years.

Moose Pond was formed by a man made stone dam years ago and was the source of blocks of ice in the years before refrigeration. Over the top of this the beaver have added their own dam, raising the level of the pond by almost three feet. We had very heavy rain in early May and the beaver dam gave way releasing a torrent of water which the ancient stone culvert at the base of the raised roadbed could not handle. A ten-foot deep gully was created where the road had been by that huge volume of water racing across it.

After a good deal of brainstorming, a local contractor was hired to do the repairs. He had equipment small enough to gain access

and was able to salvage enough fill from the site to complete a new lower roadbed and we were all happy that we again had access and had even managed to save our gate!

Then along came Irene. Even more water came pouring through the breached dam and we are again presented with a loss of access. This time the gully is only four feet deep, because the whole roadway was lowered in the reconstruction process, but nonetheless impassable. We are currently considering the installation of two culverts to act as an overflow with the help of some engineering expertise to determine size.

Mentioned in our winter newsletter, board member Trevor Squirrell is working on a "Strategic Conservation Plan" that pulls together data set information about our towns' wildlife and natural areas. Meanwhile, Catherine Stevens has volunteered to lead our board through a Sustainability Plan.
