

HELP PROTECT WHAT IS POSSIBLE: THE RAWSON FARM

For generations, the Rawson Farm has been an agricultural fixture on Cilley Hill Road within the towns of Jericho and Underhill. Acres of scenic, open meadow stretch over town lines with two barns, one in each town. Milking continues with a herd of 50 cows. JULT is pleased to be working with Burton Rawson and the Vermont Land Trust to conserve 100 acres of farm property in Jericho. The expectation is that Underhill's parcel of 206 acres will follow. Due to the high value of the land, dividing the parcels for grant writing and fundraising purposes was important.

Deborah Rawson writes in her book, "Without a Farmhouse Near" that "In 1975, Jericho had 28 farms. Ten years later it had nine. By July 1988, three farms remained in Jericho." Deborah's book documents the decline of farming, a trend that continues to this day. Fortunately, this erosion has slowed with a concerted effort by farmers, land trusts, and a supportive community to protect our agricultural heritage. statement about our towns' identity and future. Recent protections include the Riverside Meadow (2022), The Farm Upstream (2023), and the Davis Farm (2024). Now we need your help to conserve 100 acres of the Rawson Farm!

The Challenge

The appraised value of the Jericho parcel is \$825,000. Burton Rawson has generously agreed to receive \$125,000 less, which is called a bargain sale. The Vermont Housing and Conservation Board (VHCB) has approved \$271,000 in funding, and the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) has approved \$412,500. JULT has committed to raising \$20,000 and will request \$20,000 from the Town of Jericho's Conservation Reserve Fund to help pay for transaction costs. If all goes well, this land will be conserved by the end of this year. As in all conservation easements, Burton will continue to own and manage his farm, but with development restrictions and preserving its future agricultural use.

Since the early 1800s, the Rawson Farm has been a stalwart sign of our community's diverse rural economy. This project offers a crucial opportunity to protect an iconic farm for today....and tomorrow. Won't you help us meet this \$20,000 goal?

MILLS RIVERSIDE PARK'S 25TH ANNIVERSARY

On August 16, 2025, the Jericho Underhill Park District, along with JULT, celebrated the 25th Anniversary of Mills Riverside Park. JULT purchased and conserved this exquisite land on July 14, 1999, with the support of Grace Mills and her family and

extraordinary community support. feature in our community, offering the farmers' market, sports activities, six miles of trails, and opportunities to immerse oneself in our natural environment. Permanently protected, we look forward to many more years of community enjoyment.

LAND STEWARDSHIP AND BEAVERS

Your membership contribution does two things. It allows us to conserve vital land and also manage our protected areas. Both the JULT-owned Wolfrun Natural area (403 acres) and Kikas Valley Farm (361 acres) demand our attention. These properties offer rugged trails for walking, as well as sensitive wildlife habitats. Our responsibilities include paying taxes, removing invasive plants, maintaining small parking areas, replacing signs, and following management plans.

At Kikas Valley Farm, we sought expert advice about beaver habitat and possible conflicts. We asked Allaire Diamond, an ecologist from the Vermont Land Trust,

and Tyler Brown from the Vermont Department of Fish and Wildlife for their advice. A beaver dam was causing water to back up on pasture and agricultural land, and a culvert was blocked. Nearby neighbors were concerned that their houses might be affected. JULT met with the neighbors and Allaire to answer any concerns. We also hired equipment to unplug the culvert with the assurance from Tyler that the beavers would not be refilling it with mud and branches. If they did, a beaver exclusion fence would work. The coexistence of beavers with the human world is important and working. Your membership makes this possible!
