Why Conserve Land?

The subject of land conservation can seem complicated, academic and even irrelevant to many. Indeed, the process can be intricate and the decision to conserve difficult. So, how do people benefit directly from permanent land protection in the broadest sense? How is land conservation "real" in our community? In 2018, The Trust for Public Land conducted an economic analysis in Vermont and discovered many interesting facts. They found that for every \$1 spent in land conservation by the state, \$9 is returned in economic value. For example, land conservation reduces the ongoing fragmentation of our forests and helps to ensure that the forest products industry can continue. This is worth \$1.48 billion and supports 10,600 jobs. Our farming community also benefits from conserved land with \$786 million in agricultural and dairy products. Whether one buys fresh produce at the local farmers' market, farm stand or store, conserved agricultural land helps to safeguard our rural heritage. Conservation lands are also imperative to our state's tourism and outdoor recreation industry. Each year, tourists spend \$2.61 billion in Vermont. What is the attraction? Breathtaking scenic vistas, amazing fall foliage, rural expanses, and year round recreational opportunities. Of course, Vermonters enjoy the outdoors as well with 72% participating. Taken together, residents and tourists generate \$5.5 billion annually in our state and create 51,000 jobs with \$1.5 billion in wages and salaries. What else can land conservation

do? Protected lands enhance water quality, flood resilience and reduce the negative effects of climate change. Diverse wildlife habitats benefit as well. Health care costs are also decreased with exercise as a key component in fighting obesity, chronic illnesses and depression. Improving our "quality of life" helps to retain and attract workers and fuels our economy. Contrary to popular belief, conserved land often reduces property tax bills as municipal service demands do not increase compared to development.

It is clear that Vermont's return on investment in land conservation is extraordinary with a \$1 to \$9 return ratio. Furthermore, every dollar of state funding is leveraged with other nonstate monies such as fundraising, grants and town conservation funds.
